She is the author of two award-winning articles, "<u>Screech Owls Allus Holler</u> 'round the House before Death": Birds and the Souls of Black Folk in the 1930s <u>American South</u>", and "<u>Up from Childhood: When African-American Enslaved</u> <u>Children Learned of their Servile Status</u>". She is interested in slavery and forced labor studies. Her PhD looks at the relations between enslaved Africans and animals in the 19<sup>th</sup> century Atlantic world with a focus on the US South, Brazil, and Cuba.

Rachael is currently working on a digital humanities project that is creating an interactive story map of Houston's affluent African American citizens in 1915 using the Red Book of Houston, a compendium of affluent African Americans.
